THE COE FOR HEALTH IS CELEBRATING MENTAL HEALTH MONTH IN MAY

The COE for Health and the HORIZON NB Healthy Learners Program have collaborated to offer the following Mental Health information for teachers and staff in New Brunswick.

Adolescent mental health is an important focus for educators; recent data demonstrates the need for ongoing support and education for youth in the area of mental health. In New Brunswick, only 23% of students in grades 6-12 reported having high levels of mental fitness with 77% reporting low to moderate levels. Additionally, 30% of youth reported needing help for a mental or emotional problem in the last 12 months. 70 % indicated that they were uncomfortable going for help and 22% reported that they did not know where to go for help. (New Brunswick Health Council; <u>NB Student Wellness Survey Grades 6-12 2018-2019</u>).

WHAT IS POSITIVE MENTAL HEALTH?

Traditionally, mental health was defined by the presence or absence of mental health problems. Recent research indicates that individual strengths also impact our ability to enjoy life, work through challenges, get along with others, and experience emotional wellbeing. The phrase Positive Mental Health has been used to describe this strength-based approach.

Positive Mental Health is in part dependent upon our ability to meet three psychological needs: (1) relatedness refers to the need to belong and connect with others, (2) autonomy is the need for personal freedom to make choices and control our own behavior, and (3) competence is the need to feel that we have strengths and abilities that are recognized.

Practical tips to promote positive mental health for students:

- Strong supportive relationships are foundational to promoting mental health in youth. Check-in regularly and encourage students to express thoughts and feelings. Demonstrate acceptance and ask questions to clarify understanding.
- Help students discover their unique strengths and abilities. Provide opportunities to develop skills and work to their potential.
- Provide choice when possible.
- Facilitate the development of problem-solving skills.
- Encourage students to pursue interests and hobbies.
- Communicate positively.
- Celebrate achievements and praise efforts.
- Incorporate instruction regarding relaxation techniques and emotional management.
- Encourage daily physical activity, healthy eating, and regular sleep.
